

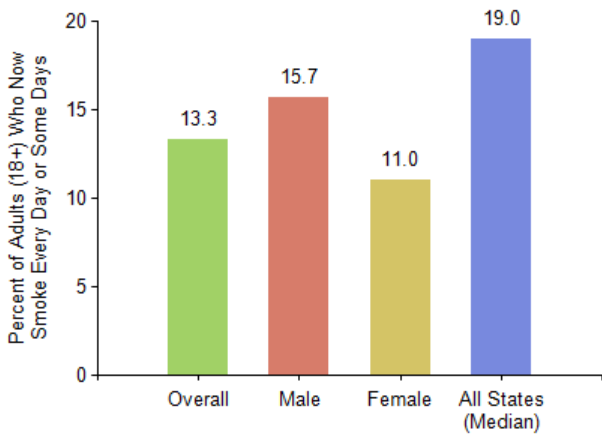

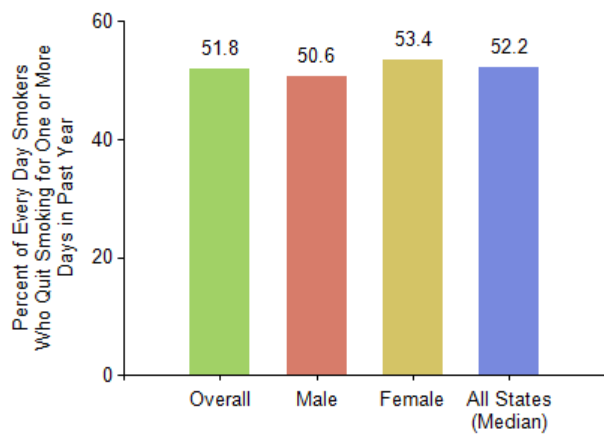

Cigarette Use (Adults), 2013



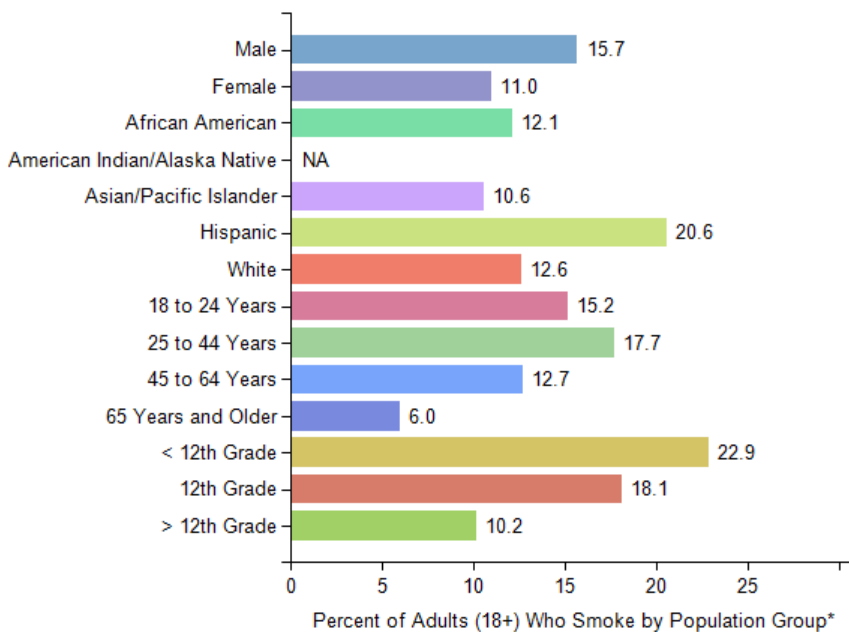

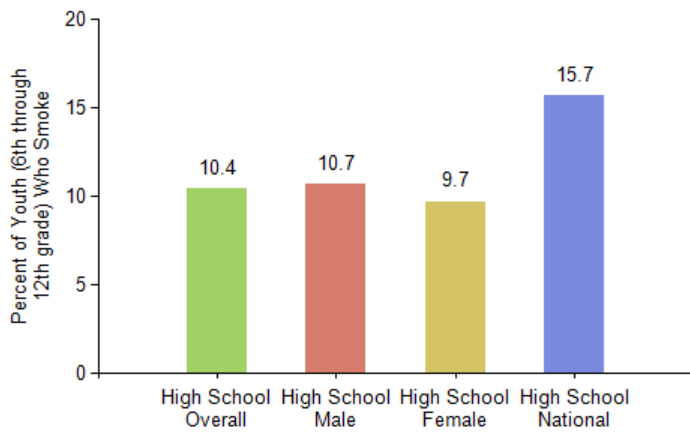
Current Smoking (Adults), 2013

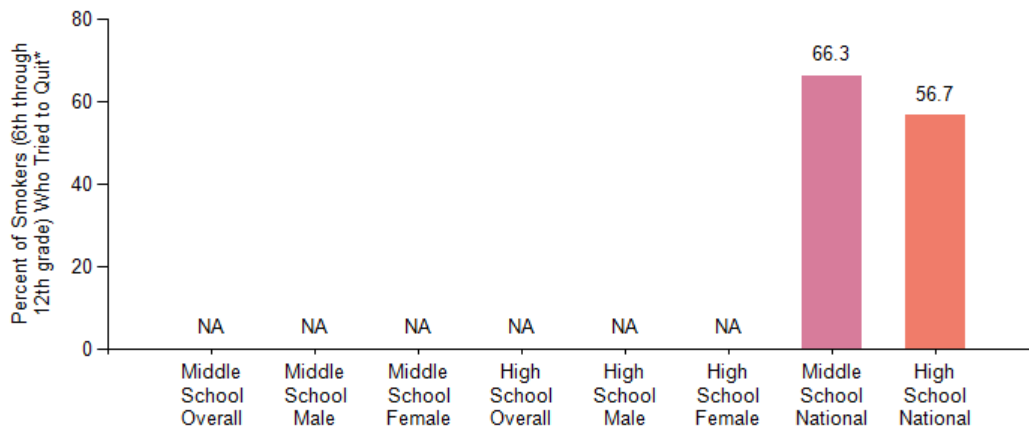

Cessation (Youth), 2011

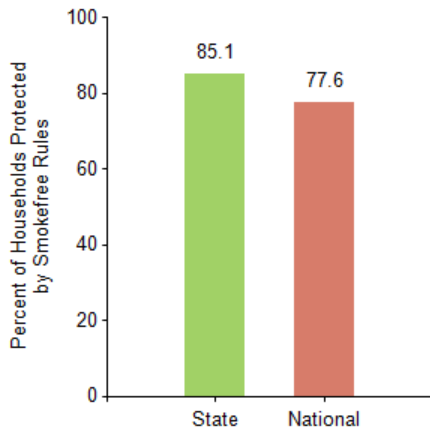

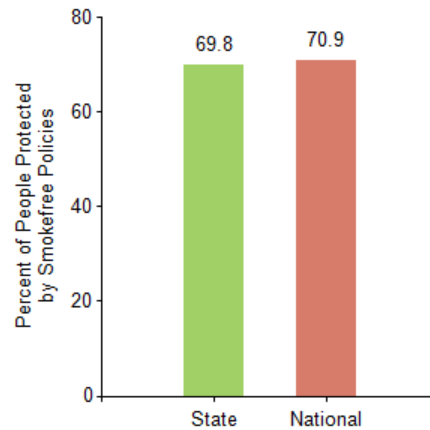
Smokefree Policies in Homes, 2010-2011

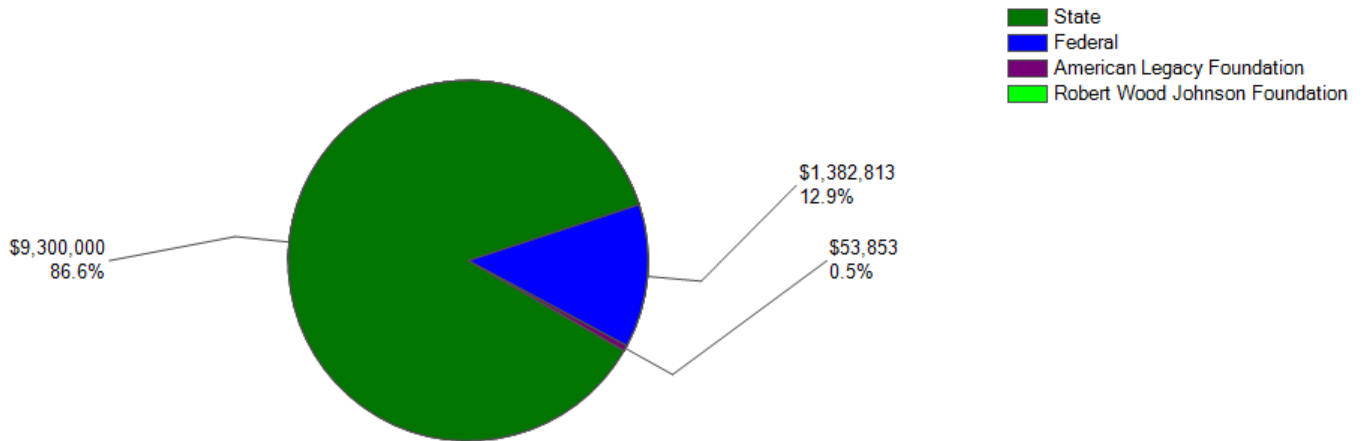

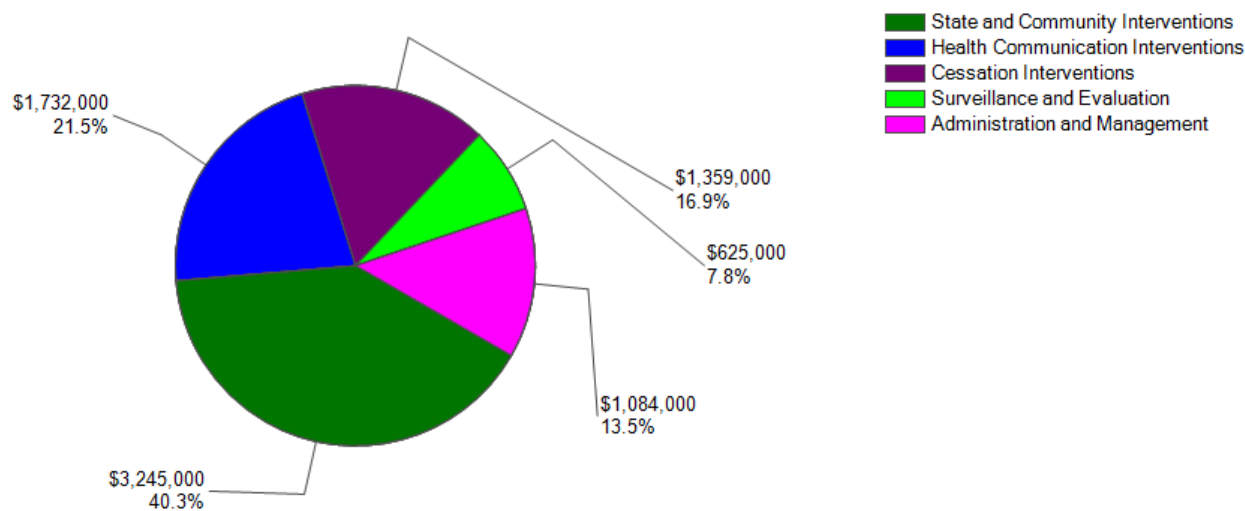

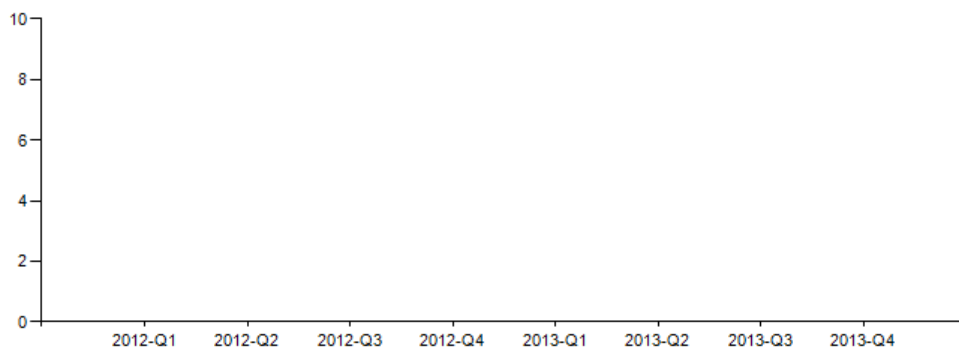

Total Incoming Calls

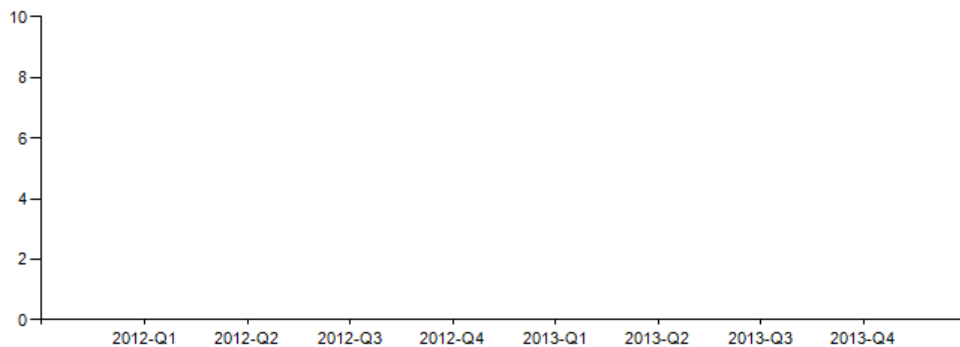

Total Callers Who Received Counseling and/or Medications †



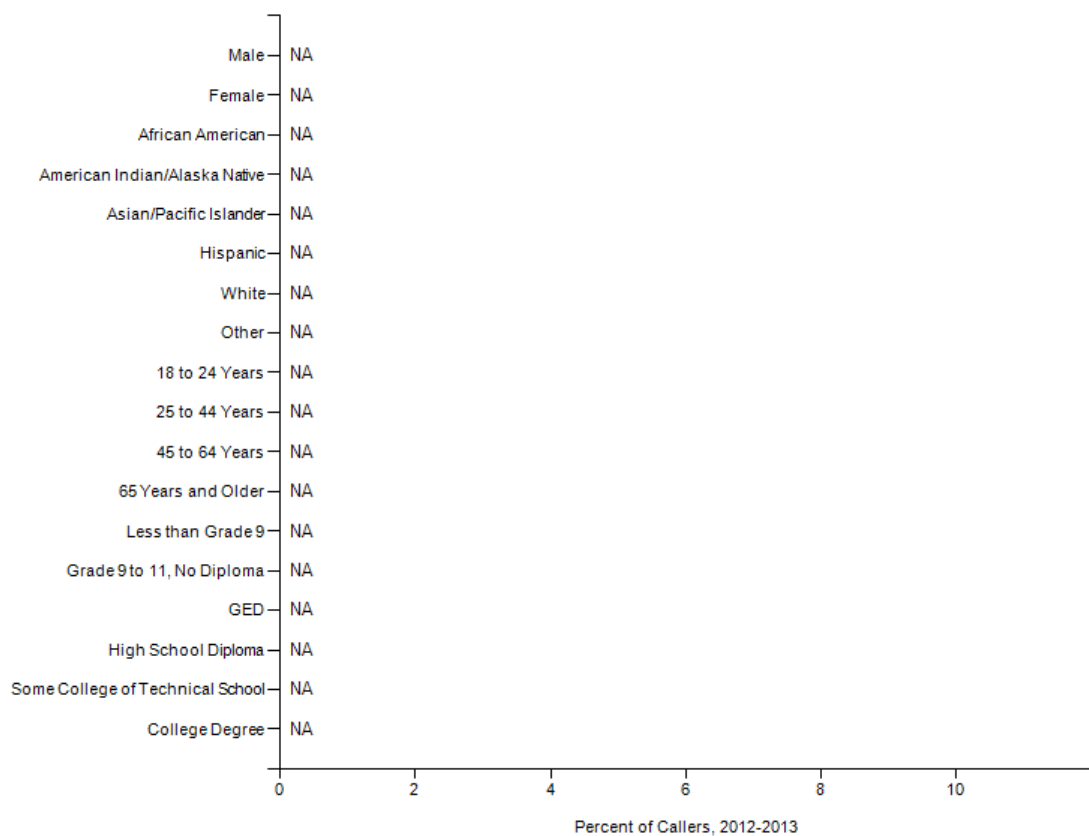

Characteristics of Callers † ‡, 2012-2013

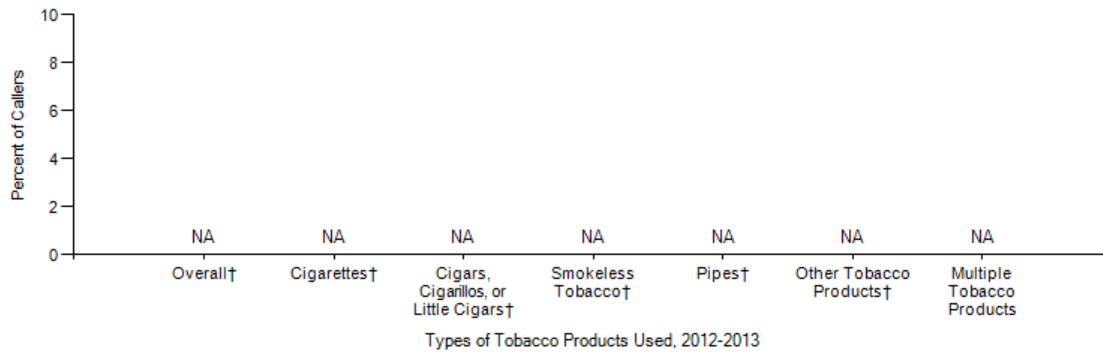
