

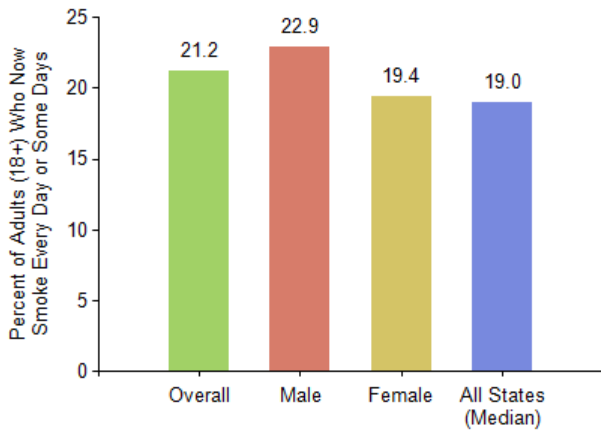

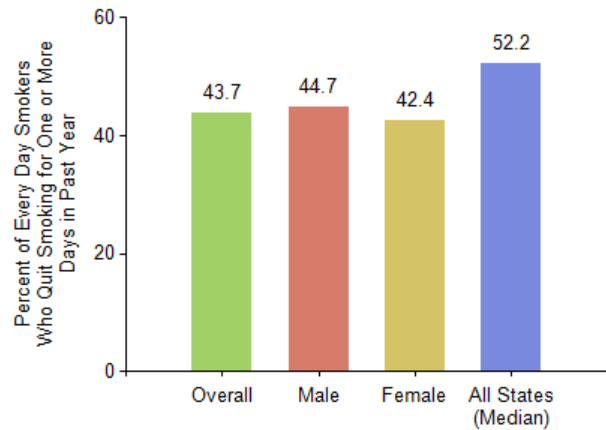

**Cigarette Use (Adults), 2013**



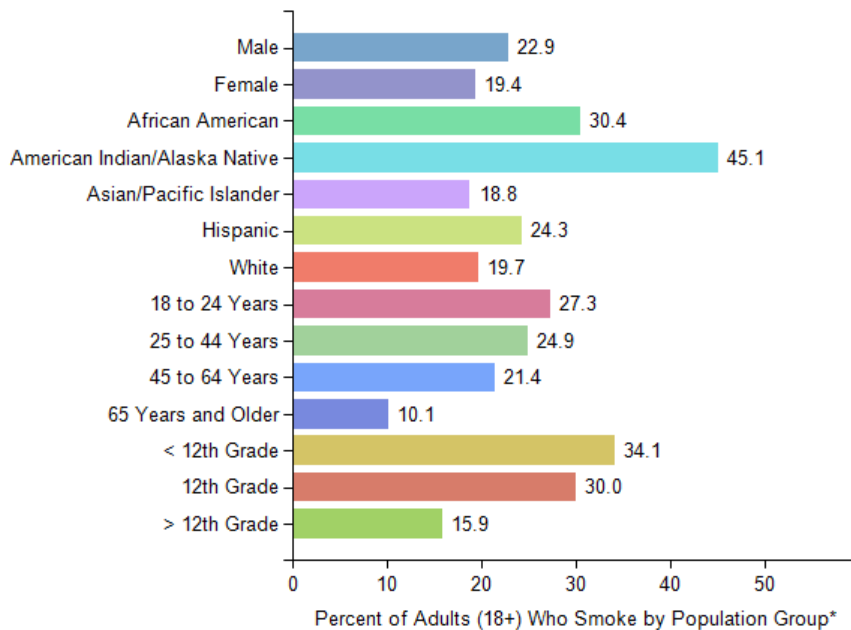

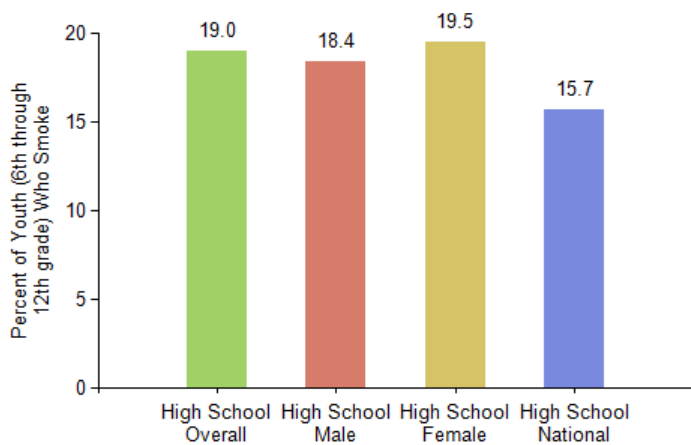
**Current Smoking (Adults), 2013**

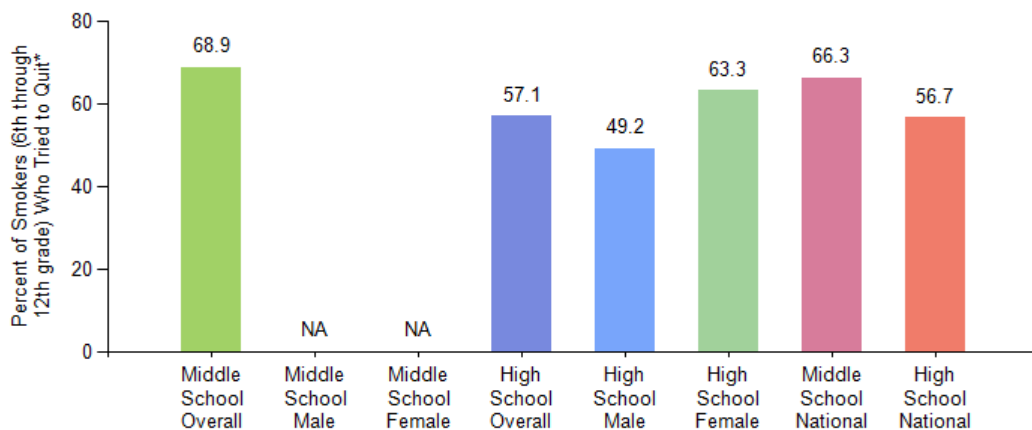

### Cessation (Youth), 2013

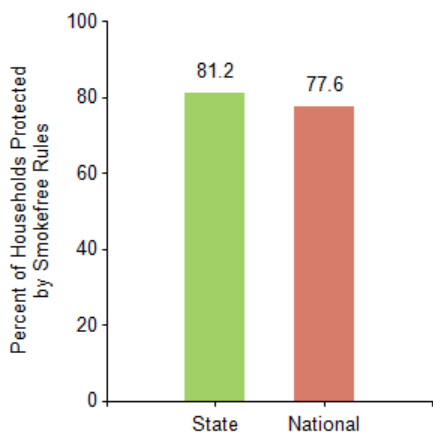

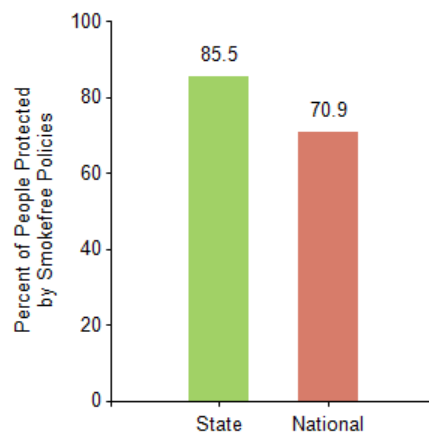
### Smokefree Policies in Homes, 2010-2011

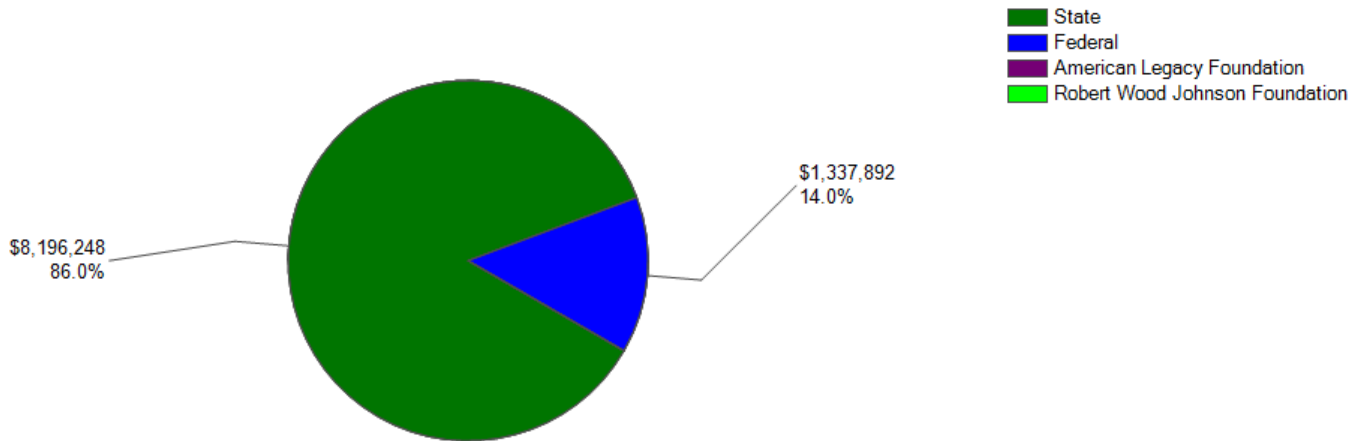

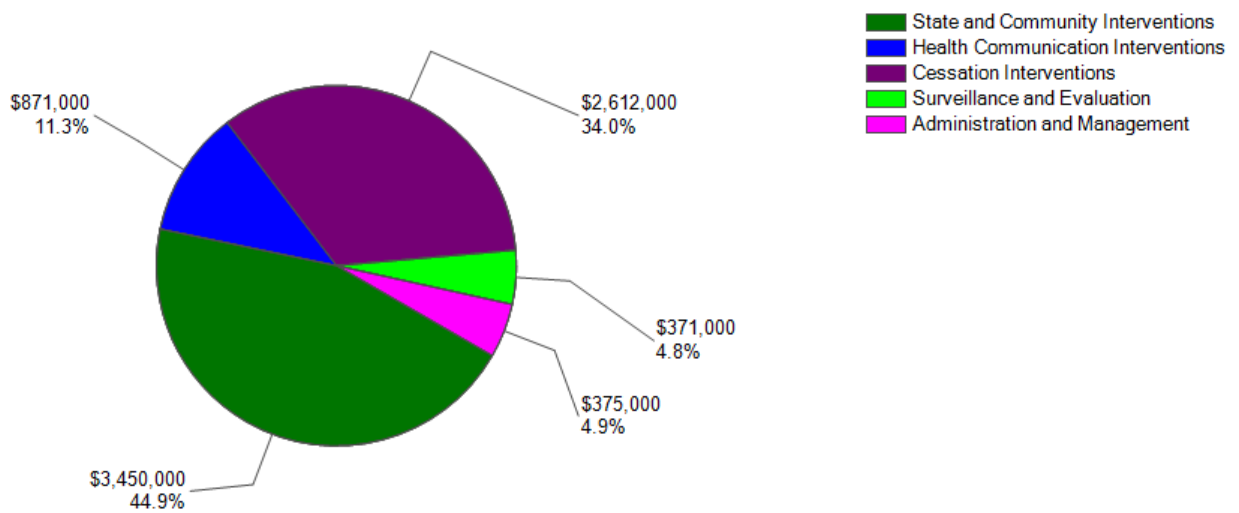
